NGĀI TE RANGI RECENTLY TRAVELLED TO WELLINGTON FOR THE WAI2840 HAURAKI OVERLAPPING CLAIMS INQUIRY

Waitangi Tribunal

Ngāi Te Rangi put its case to the Waitangi Tribunal regarding the Hauraki claims into Tauranga Moana on 8 to 12 April 2019 at Waiwhetū Marae in Wellington.

This was the first opportunity in three years where Ngāi Te Rangi could share facts that backed its case against the Hauraki land grab, and to finally be heard by the Crown, those present, and by the wider public. The hearing broke records for the most views by livestream which is an indication of the high interest in the issues under examination not only for Ngāi Te Rangi, but for all iwi that border Pare Hauraki, and also all iwi that face similar experiences with the Crown.

Koro Hauata opened for the Ngāi Te Rangi witnesses succinctly and clearly. He reiterated the message that it is only Ngāi Te Rangi, Ngāti Ranginui and Ngāti Pukenga that hold Mana Moana and Mana Whenua in Tauranga Moana. Matakana was his home, and the pepeha “mai i Matakana ki Matakana” is a lie, he said. He finished by letting it be known that Ngāi Te Rangi will continue to pursue this matter until it is resolved to our satisfaction. If the Tribunal gets it wrong, it will not be the end of our efforts.

“e kore rawa, e kore rawa, e kore rawa a Ngāi Te Rangi e takoto, e kore kore rawa a Ngāi Te Rangi e tūohu, e korekore rawa a Ngāi Te Rangi e tūpou”

Charlie Tawhiao followed Koro Hauata strong and honourably.

A sense of relief and pride was shared by our people for completing this part of the process. A sense of relief that after a hard couple of years in battle, the Crown were finally made to explain their actions and acknowledge their wrongdoing. A sense of pride knowing that we withstood the criticisms and tactics of the Crown over the past couple of years, remained steadfast to our principles and followed through with our actions, which resulted in all the people responsible having to front up to the Tribunal.

There is still a process to go through to finish the legal part of the inquiry.

Closing submissions will be completed by the start of June 2019. Following this we have been given an indicative timeframe from three months to a year for a report to be delivered from the Tribunal.

The effort in the Tribunal is just one part of the ongoing fight against Hauraki intrusion. We hope for a positive outcome but regardless, the fight against the Crown actions will continue as long as it needs to, to right the wrongs of the Ardern Confiscations.

Te Rangi Hou

Te Rangi Hou is the Ngāi Te Rangi Iwi Rangatahi Leadership Forum comprised of twelve rangatahi aged between 18 and 25 who whakapapa to Ngāi Te Rangi.

The Forum was formed at the end of 2018 with a call for Ngāi Te Rangi rangatahi to submit an application via video describing a current issue our rangatahi are facing today. The applications were of the highest calibre and highlighted some big concerns rangatahi felt they could work to address within the Forum.

From those who applied we have formed our first intake for 2019.

The initial task of the Forum is to develop a Rangatahi Engagement Strategy - a plan to create two-way meaningful communications and contributions between rangatahi and the Iwi so that all remain informed and responsive to one another. Over time we will expand efforts to rangatahi development and career pathway opportunities.

An inaugural wānanga of Te Rangi Hou was held at Whareroa Marae in April 2019. With some external inspiration and guidance of Riria Te Kanawa the group learnt the basic foundations of strategic planning and started to refine thinking around an action plan for the next 6 months. An innovative session facilitated by our very own Te Kahu Rolleston was held, where spoken word master pieces were created by our rangatahi. He mihi nui ki a Riria me Te Kahu i whakarangatira ai te kaupapa.

All in all, the wānanga has set the benchmark for positive and high energy activity over the coming months.

Te Rangi Hou aim to have a draft engagement strategy for presentation at a 'Ngāi Te Rangi Rangatahi Summit' in September 2019. The summit will provide an opportunity for further development and design of the strategy by the rangatahi, with the aim of it being fully endorsed by the Rangatahi at the end of the Summit. More details to come.



Ngā Ture o Opureora

For almost 15 years, Opureora Marae has had an unwritten policy of being completely alcohol and drug free.

Although the Marae had a small informal sign outlining the various ture (rules) of the marae outside the wharekai, hapū secretary Nessie Kuka consulted with CAYAD Ngāi Te Rangi and mobilised her hapū trust to formalise the policy in a recent trust hui.

Opureora Marae also used this policy as an opportunity for one of the local rangatahi, Areena Taingahue-Smith, to showcase her talent and design the new signage for the marae.

Nessie Kuka says although many rangatahi are familiar with the ture (rules) of Opureora Marae - the signage is another element to ensure our next generation take on the responsibilities of the Marae.

“They need to be able to step in to our shoes when we are no longer able. Some of our rangatahi are already participating in leadership roles, so we are working together with them to set these standards for our next lot of kaitiaki to follow.”

The mission for the CAYAD team at Ngāi Te Rangi is to engage with whanau and hapu members to raise awareness around the harmful effects of drugs and alcohol and to support initiatives, like these Marae policies, that promote safer communities and positive life choices.



Mangopare, the hammerhead shark, represents strength, leadership, agility, tenacity, unrelenting determination, courage and wealth— a guardian to many, especially those close to the sea. As such, it is a fitting visualisation for the people of Ngai Te Rangi Iwi.

Mai Whareroa ki Maungatapu puta noa ki Te Rereatukāhia

He hōtaka hou tēnei kua ara mai i te hononga o Ngāi Te Rangi me tō tātou whare wānanga, Te Whare Wānanga o Awanuiārangi.

He huarahi tēnei hei hiki ake i te mana o ngā marae, o ngā hapū, o ngā whānau o Ngāi Te Rangi e aro pūmau ai ki tō tātou reo puiaki, o tātou tikanga, tō tātou kawa me te rongomaiwhiti o tēnā, o tēnā, hei hiki i te tuakiritanga o Ngāi Te Rangi whānui.

He tuatahitanga noa tēnei engari nō Te Whare Reo te whiwhi kua hono mai a Te Rereatukāhia Marae, a Tamawhariua ki uta, ki te kaupapa nei hei tauira mō ngā marae me ngā hapū huri noa i a Ngāi Te Rangi. Kātahi anō te whānau o Te Rereatukāhia ka timata i ā rātou wānanga marae me te mīharo o ngā hua, o ngā tāngata kua pae mai. Kua hīkaka te whānau kia whakakōkiri i te kaupapa nei hei oranga mō te marae, mō te hapū, mō ngā uri whakatupu. Kei te whai atu ngā marae o Opureora me Maungatapu i te huarahi kua parahia e Te Rereatukāhia.

Te Tuakiri

Ngāi Te Rangi is a member of the Tauranga Moana Youth Offending Team (MYOT), a coalition of government, iwi and community representatives with a goal of achieving long lasting change for young Māori offenders in Tauranga Moana.

In response, Ngāi Te Rangi have established Te Tuakiri Programme for rangatahi who have offended and are before Te Kooti Rangatahi (the Youth Court). Rangatahi can be referred to our 10 week programme that is centred on Te Tuakiri o Te Tangata – the identity of the person.

The programme infuses social work practice and tikanga Māori to educate, inspire and support the rangatahi towards positive change. The first intake for Te Tuakiri was held between February and April 2019 and has in this short time demonstrated the benefits of such a programme.

A rangatahi standing with confidence to recite their pepeha before the Court for us is success. Whilst to some this may seem like a simple exercise, it symbolises so much more - the knowledge learnt, the pride instilled and respect for one's self and others despite the adversities faced represents a big milestone.

We believe in the value of Te Ao Maori and we want all our people to have the opportunity to deepen that connection. Te Tuakiri is just one pathway specifically targeted towards our youth caught up in the Court system. It gives life to the whakatauākī "Ko te ao kia Maori ko te tuakiri kia Ngāi Te Rangi"
